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IAGOR GABRIEL CHILASHVILI (1790-1838) – PROSECUTOR OF THE SUPREME GOVERNMENT OF GEORGIA

Georgia knows many public men and thinkers in the 19th century. Among them is Iagor Chilashvili one of the most prominent public men, who during his tenure of the legal career, tried his best to ease the burden of the life condition of his people by his attempts to make the prosecutor's supervision more efficient and protect his people both, plaintiffs and defendants, who were unaware of the laws. from unfair trial of the Russian officials.

I. Chilashvili was appointed the prosecutor of Georgia in 1822 by the immediate support of Ermolov, Czar's governor, who in his turn tried to select honest and educated officials on the positions.

I. Chilashvili and his family had accompanied Prince Vakhtang Batonishvili in his exile in Russia.

Vakhtang Batonishvili, himself a childless man, took patronage of the family and helped them to receive good education.

In 1815 I. Chilashvili joined "Dying Sphinx", Lobzin Lodge of freemasons Lodges and all the other secret organizations.

Having held the prosecutor's office I. Chilashvili carried out much work for making out the relationships between feudals and serfs. Although his position obliged him to work for the Czarism interests he managed to serve his people as well.

I. Chilashvili enjoyed close relationship with the leading members of the intelligentsia in Georgia and with the one who would come from Russia to stay in Georgia. I. Chilashvili shared fellow feelings with members of the 1932 plot, who had prepared two portfolios of the minister in case of their victory. This fact was enough for the authorities to suspect him to be an accomplice of the conspirators and he was exiled to Lencora where he died in 1838 and was buried there.
